And alusians are still a rather "pure" breed in the sense that they have not been bred with other breeds. Some horses, such as the Connemara and the Lipizzaner horses have Andalusian blood in them, but the Andalusian is still basically the same as it was hundreds of years ago. This is a reliable and intelligent breed and they tend to have an average life expectancy. And alusians are rather rare in the United States even today. However, this is a wonderful breed and may be worth the extra effort it takes to find one. Proper diet, exercise, grooming and veterinary attention will benefit both you and your Andalusian.

# Selecting Your Andalusian Horse

Choosing and buying any kind of horse can be a daunting task, especially if you do not have much experience in this process. The first question you should ask yourself is what do you plan on using the horse for? Your answer can change the qualities you are looking for in a horse. Andalusians are a good all-purpose breed. You can train an Andalusian to race, to be a rodeo horse or to participate in the show ring. You may buy a horse and then find out it is better at jumping than racing, or vice versa. 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### A Few Words About Auctions

If you decide to look for an Andalusian at a horse auction, do some research before you go to the auction. Usually, you will be able to find information on various auction houses online. You can also ask around your community to find out what kind of reputation the auction house may have. It may be a good idea to find another owner who has bought from this auction house. What was their experience with this auction house? Try to find out as much history as you can regarding the horse you are interested in. Is the horse already registered? What is its pedigree? Horses may be at an auction for many reasons. Sometimes an auction is just another avenue for a breeder to sell his horses. An auction may be a cheaper way to buy a horse, but you will probably have to be a little more careful since you will not be able to see what kind of training or life the horse has come from.

### A Few Words About Breeders

If you are interested in buying an Andalusian from a breeder, make sure they are reputable. There are lists of breeders online and in published magazines. Visit the farm, bringing your own expert with you if you are not sure what you are looking at or feel uncomfortable going on your own. Make an appointment to visit the farm and look at the horses you are interested in. Look at the facilities the horse has been kept in. Are they clean? Has the horse been kept mostly in a stall or in a pasture? How does the horse interact with other horses and people? Also, make sure the breeder has the registration papers from a reputable horse registry and verify the horse's registration and current ownership with the registry. You also should be able to see the horse's papers and lineage. If the horse's parents are at the farm, ask to visit with them as well. All of these things will give you a better idea of what kind of horse you are looking at.

Choosing to adopt or purchase from a breeder is viable based on your own knowledge, expectations, and personal conviction. The most important thing to remember when selecting your pet is to choose the one that is right for you. Pet ownership is a big responsibility. Select a pet that fits your lifestyle.

# Bringing Your Andalusian Home

Choose your vet before you have any problems, since it will help your vet to see how your horse acts when it is healthy so he can help your horse when he is sick. Horses are a bigger responsibility than the average house pet. However, if you pay attention to the needs of your horse, you will be a success as a new horse owner.

### The Andalusian Foal

Each stage of your horse's life will be characterized by special needs. Foals' lives are full of learning experiences from the day they are born. While it is a foal, your horse will depend on its mother for food. After it is weaned, you will need to pay particular attention to its feeding so it will grow up with healthy eating habits. Growing horses will need additional grain or supplements to help them grow up strong and healthy.

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### The Andalusian Adult

As your foal ages into an adult, his needs will begin to change. And alusians very much enjoy human contact, so it is vital that you stay in touch and interact with them daily.

As a breed, Andalusians generally eat a moderate amount of food. Pay attention to what your horse eats and you should get a good idea of how much to feed him every day. It is also vital that you do not over feed a horse. If a horse eats too much, he can develop founder, which is a serious inflammation of the hooves. A horse can also develop colic if he eats too much rich feed, which can include grass in the spring, high protein feeds and too much grain. If a horse is being shown or is more active, obviously he will require more feed than usual. All horses will need constant access to a salt block to replace the essential minerals they lose during the day.

As your Andalusian ages, his hooves, coat, skin, eyes and teeth may need special attention. Make grooming a happy, special time for your horse. You should keep his coat well-groomed, free of dirt and debris. You will also need to have a farrier visit to care for your horse's hooves and horseshoes. If your horse is well-groomed, healthy and happy, your time together will be much more enjoyable.

### The Andalusian Senior

As your Andalusian ages, his needs will change again. Andalusians age at about the same rate as any other breed. You will need to reevaluate your senior's feeding and care needs as he ages. As a general rule, much like any other animal, a horse's skin, eyes, teeth and hooves age and may require different care than they did in their youth. You can help your horse age gracefully with proper feeding, exercise and care.

A senior horse's disposition may change over the years just as any senior's demeanor can change as they age. They may be grumpy when introduced to new things or if they simply do not want to do something you ask them to do.

You will have many happy years and memories with your Andalusian. Horses can be a very special part of your family and can add many happy memories during its life. Andalusians are an intelligent and loving breed that will give you a lot of love, memories and unforgettable times.

### Tack

Tack is an all-encompassing word that basically refers to the equipment you will need for your horse to care for and ride him. These items include halters, bridles, saddles, and other equipment.

As a general rule, Andalusians are average to large in size. Most Andalusians are average sized for the breed. You may need help in finding suitable tack, but you need to look at your Andalusian and go with the tack most comfortable for him. Ask other Andalusian owners for advice, and usually a tack store employee can be helpful as well.

### Feed

Most Andalusian's require a moderate amount of feed. The amount of feed your horse will need depends on how active it is. You will need high quality feed and should always make sure your horse is eating enough. They still need a proper mix of vitamins and minerals to stay healthy. Quality feed and plenty of fresh, clean water will keep your horse healthy and happy. In addition to grain, your horse will need to be able to graze in a pasture or have access to hay. A salt block and possibly mineral supplements are also vital to your horse's health. A salt block should be accessible at all times for the horse's use. You can also research this topic by asking other owners or by referring to books.



### **Medical Considerations**

As a breed, Andalusian's are genetically sound and healthy. It is rare for an Andalusian to have any genetic problems, and is generally one of the soundest and healthiest breeds you can find. However, the breed does not have a large genetic base as many other breeds do, so you will want to check into your horse's lineage and if at all possible to see your horse's parents.
